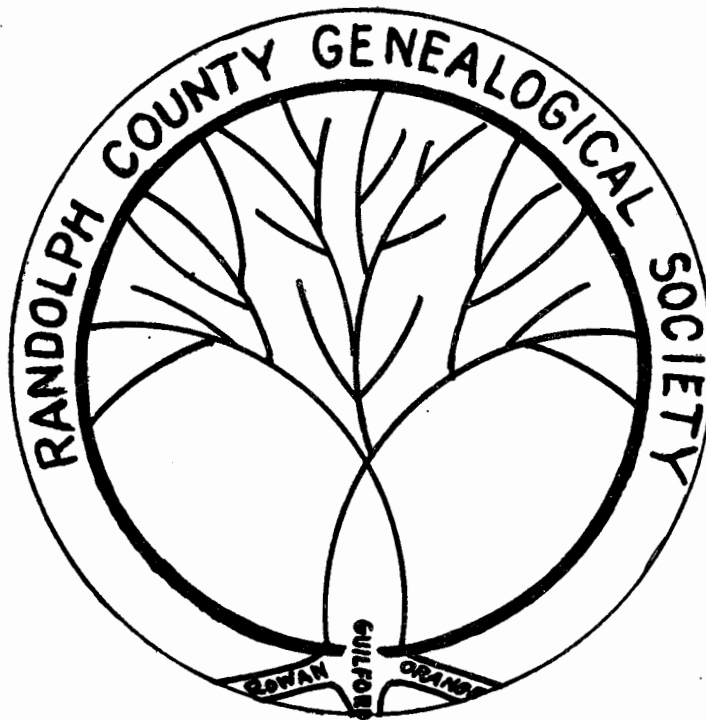

The Randolph County Genealogical Society is a non-profit organization formally organized under the Randolph County Historical Society on October 19, 1976. Membership is open to all interested in Randolph County, North Carolina. Annual dues for Sustaining Membership are \$ 25.00; Institutional Membership, \$10.00; and Individual Membership, \$ 8.00, which include subscription to the Journal. All individual members are requested to file a pedigree chart with the society.

The Genealogical Journal shall publish such material as is of interest to historians and genealogists with roots in Randolph. Since the county was derived from Guilford in 1779, which was a part of Rowan and Orange counties prior to 1771, some data from those counties will be included also. Contributions of unpublished material: Bible records, letters, diaries, and other private papers will be welcome by the editors.

All effort is made to be accurate. Neither the Journal nor the Society can assume responsibility for errors on the part of contributors. Proved errors will be corrected in a later issue.

Queries are free to all individual members, but must be accompanied by a pedigree chart or family sheet relative to same.

Publication reviews or advertisements will be printed free after receipt of a copy of the publication, which will become the property of the Randolph County Genealogical Society and deposited in the Randolph Room of the Randolph County Public Library.

At the executive meeting in October a motion was made and passed to extend the time of payment of membership dues until January 1, 1981, with records being kept by the calendar year instead of the fiscal year as previously has been the policy. 

The four pages of the Bible plus an insert on another piece of paper were submitted by Claude PICKETT, 4516 Chapel Hill Blvd., Durham, NC 27707. Spelling and unconventional punctuation were retained in the copying, denotative of entries by different persons.

On motion ordered that Isaac LANE Sheriff expose to Public Sale after advertising agreeable to Law two Negroes by the names of Ben & Shadrick Now confined in th Jail as runaways.

In Obedience to the Decree of this Court at November term 1832 in the Case of Nathan KENDELL & wife and others, petition for sale of Negroes, he proceeded on the 5th day of January 1833, after having advertised according to Law, to sell the same, viz - Margaret and her Boy Hampton, & Thomas PARK, being the last & highest Bidder, became the purchaser of both the said slaves, at the price of Four Hundred & Sixty one Dollars, for which sum he took Bond & Security of the said Thomas PARK one half due in Six Months, & the other half in twelve months from the date of Sale.

The petition of B. A. SELLERS and Frusannah his wife, J. M. JORDAN and Lousannah his wife and Mary KIME respectfully showeth unto your Worships that they are Tenants in Common of a certain slave by name Emsley about Forty six years old.

Your petitioners further show that they desire to have the said slave divided among them according to their respective rights and interests in the same, but that a division in kind cannot be made without injury to the parties concerned. Your petitioners therefore pray your Worships to order a sale thereof, on such terms as shall seem to your Worships best, and that the proceeds of the sale, may be divided among them according to their respective rights and interests in said slave. And your petitioners as in duty bound will ever pray.

OLD ABANDONED CEMETERY

By

Mr. & Mrs. F. J. WRENN, Jr. and Francine H. SWAIM

This old abandoned cemetery, formerly designated "on Old Henry MOON Farm," is reached by turning right off paved State Road 2407 onto a dirt road #2411 northwest of Liberty. It is located in the woods on the GILMORE farm turning left from #2411 and following the access roads through fields planted in nursery stock for GILMORE Plant and Bulb Co., Julian, NC.

In reading these old cemeteries we feel it is important that you readers know of the other unmarked or marked graves without inscriptions in order to ascertain the size of the burying ground, and evidence of graves that could be of your ancestors. While it is an unprovable fact that an unmarked grave next to one with a readable marker could be of a spouse, it can be a fairly safe assumption, and we hope this method of reading proves of value to you.

The cemetery was read left to right beginning at the row nearest the edge of the woods.

Row 1:

Evidence of graves in this row begins about halfway down the next row. There are six marked graves with fieldstone markers. There is one impression showing another grave. There could be more graves to the right where the growth is too thick to examine adequately.

Row 2:

A grave with a fieldstone marker
John FRUIT died 12 May 1824, aged 86.
Another grave marked with a fieldstone
E. F., 1783
John FRUIT, died 25 Dec. 1798.
Elizabeth PUGH, died 1794, age 85. (Welborn's records have 2 Nov., but not readable in 1980.)
Fieldstone foot marker. (There is an oblong hole where the headstone of this grave would be, probably where the headstone of Thomas PUGH, who died 30 Nov. 1797, has been removed.)
Unmarked space
Fieldstone headmarker

1 adult grave marked with a fieldstone
1 child's grave marked with a fieldstone
Priscilla CAMPBELL, no dates. (This appears to be a child's grave.)

Row 5:

Only 2 unmarked depressions are in this row before a marble marker
located about the center of the other rows. It is evident that this marker
was erected some while after the last burial in the cemetery. On one side
is the inscription:

David CAMPBELL, died 1862, age 75 years.
Elizabeth FLINTOM, his wife, died 1850, age 53 years.

On the other side is:
Balaam CAMPBELL, a brother
Ann CAMPBELL, a sister, rest in this plot.

In addition to the above tombstones, Mrs. WELBORN's records of 1933
contain listings of:

Zion Methodist Church is located just off State Road #2468 near Staley. The church property line is almost on the Chatham-Randolph County line, and many of the people buried there lived in Randolph County. Randolph Wayne WARD, in charge of the cemetery, informed us that it was originally a WILLIAMS family cemetery.

There has been a great deal of sickness the past winter principally lagrippe and lung fever. Gideon and I were very sick with lagrippe I trust you have fully recovered from your severe spell of sicness and that you are all blessed with health. Well we looked for you Christmas, and were very much disappointed that you did not come however we hope to see you some time in the future. You will find it a very pleasant trip, or at least I enjoyed it, notwithstanding I had sick headache on the way home. I shall always be glad that we had the pleasure of visiting you, and seeing you so pleasantly situated. I am so glad that you are living Christian lives. What a friend we have in Jesus. How bless the thought that we all may recline, like John the beloved and blest, On Jesus' strong arm. Why! no tempest can harm, Secure in that haven of rest. PLEASANT LODGE ACADEMY

Feb. 28th 1876

The Building Committee of Pleasant Lodge Academy met at P. C. SMITH'S House, and organized by electing J. C. BAIN chairman and W. M. KIME secretary.

The following members being present - Geo. PATTERSON, U. S. JOHNSON, James BURGESS, A. A. CRUTCHFIELD, A. J. PATTERSON and H. C. REITZEL.

A resolution was offered by U. S. JOHNSON and second by George PATTERSON to set the end of the House to front the road. After considerable discussion the vote was taken and the resolution was lost.

A. J. PATTERSON offered a resolution to put two doors in the side of the House next to the Road, which resolution was agreed upon by an almost unanimous vote.

A motion to set the front side of the House back even with the back side of the Well House; was agreed upon.

It was moved and seckoned that the Masonick Hall be put up on one end of the schoolroom. The vote being taken the resolution was lost.

A resolution by Geo. Patterson to dispend with locating chimniny tile we write to Mr. EDWARDS and get his views upon the matter which motion was carried.

A Motion by A. J. PATTERSON that a dore be made near the center of the east side of the House; and stairs be run up to enter the Lodge Room - which motion was agreed upon. It was agreed upon at a former meeting that each 2 horse team be allowed \$2 per day for hauling Lumber & Shingles.

James BURGESS was elected at a former to act as fireman-for which he received \$1.20 per day; and that all others who have thee use of tools be allowed \$1. per day; and that all common hands be allowed .62 1/2 per day.

Moved and seckoned that lowest place in bottom of side be 1 foot from the ground which was agreed upon.

Resolved that each one that furnishes lumber for said House; be allowed twist the amount that he pays for saving said lumber.

There being no further business the meting adjourned to meet on the Lodge grounds on the 13th of March 1876 at the hour of 8 O'clock A. M.

William Young JARMAN

William Young JARMAN was born about 1792 in North Carolina. In November 1792 (?) a land entry was made in his name for 100 acres of land in Cumberland Co., NC; Francis WALKER paid the fee for this entry, and Emory JARMAN (1763-1839) was a chain bearer for the survey. William JARMAN left Cumberland Co. after 1818 and returned to Cumberland Co. in 1836 after losing his possessions in Randolph Co. He was administer of the 1849 estate of David WALKER, son of the above mentioned Francis WALKER. Census records show that William and Celia WRENN had 6 sons and 3 daughters. The names of Francis, Shadrick, and Jackson JARMAN appear in various records with William and although the relationship is not stated it is probable that they are three of those sons. Additionally, William had four illegitimate sons by Elizabeth HOLDER before he married her. William died between the 1870 and 1880 census. He lived in that part of Cumberland Co. that became Harnett Co., NC.

Emery GERMAN sold his land in Randolph Co., NC in 1825. He has not been positively identified outside of Randolph Co. until 1850 when he appears in the census of Tippah Co., Miss. In 1855 he moved to Hardeman Co., TN. His two sons have not been located after 1860. The date or place of Emery GERMAN's death is not known.

David GERMAN

David GERMAN left Randolph Co., NC about 1829 and then he appears in the 1830 census of Union Co., IN. It may be that he and his family traveled with the Quaker migration in 1829. David's religion is no known, but his wife had Quaker relatives. In 1834 David purchased land in Sugar Creek Twp., Shelby Co., IN. He soon sold this and bought more in the same area. He sold his land in 1837 and never owned land again. Although he is in the 1840 census of Davies Co., IN, it appears that David spent the rest of his life in the vicinity of Boggstown in Shelby Co. and Needham and Clarksville (Rocklane) in Johnson Co., IN. His place of burial is not known.

THOMAS T. NEWBY'S BOOK

1865 - 1857

PART III

Now "Commodore" and "Prince" settle to their task of pulling the wagon over mountains and valleys in company with the led horse, "Charley," while the three young wagoners from Carthage stop to inspect a cave. Soon they are nearing the Natural Bridge of Virginia. This is the sixth installment:

The 23rd. Mountains! Mountains!! We have stopped for dinner in the Alleghany valley close to a hotel: having crossed the large Alleghany mountain, which is some 3 miles over. Lots of pine timber along here; the mountains look splendid. All covered over with trees that are perfectly green. The timber on the Snel mountains is mostly chestnut. We saw some fine farming land this morning, down in the valleys. We crossed Green Brier river on a bridge this morning: a nice stream of water, We stopped at the White Sulphur Spring this morning and got a drink of the waters. It is the most awful water that I ever drank; we could not compare it to anything in taste and smell, but rotten eggs; quite odoriferous indeed. Very nice place; quite a number of buildings around it; one row of them about $\frac{1}{4}$ of a mile long. We were informed that there were 1,500 boarders there the past summer; but they are all gone now. Camped to night on Jackson above James river, close to a wagon of movers. They say that they have been feeding their horses on roasting ears and green fodder; could get nothing else, and not much of that. After dinner we crossed the little Alleghany mountains; saw mountains, rock and pine trees where ever we gaped; and that only once, for it was all the time. Came through Covington, which is a hard looking town, all penned in with mountains. Here I expected to get a letter from home; but on inquiring, was disappointed. Saw more "sink holes" today; by the way, we saw a quantity of them yesterday. They are places or hollows, or rather basins at the bottoms of and between the mountains with no outlets to them except just to sink right down through the rocks, which it does, and then what becomes of it I know not. I saw a "telegraph" to convey water from a spring up hill, as we were coming along today. It was a wire fixed up from the spring to the house, and then by means of a wheel and axle and rope a bucket is let down to the spring on the wire, and drawn up again on the same.

The 24th. Put our horse in a stable last night; eat our supper of corn bread and butter, etc. We started this morning before breakfast, traveled about $\frac{1}{4}$ a mile, stopped and fed our horses, on the bank of Jackson river; the same we camped near last night. We proceeded then to go into a cave that was on the opposite side of the river from where we stopped to feed our horses, having just forded the river. We undertook to go over to the cave on the rock in the river, but H. missed his footing once and thus got a foot bath, and some how or other the lantern (which we were taking for a light) got in the water, and after getting it again

and bothering about awhile, a man came and told us there was a man with a skiff who would take us over. We went forth-with, and soon were across & exploring the interior of this mundane sphere. We went in the cave some 75 or 80 yards, got some fine specimens of rock, and then returned. It is a very extensive cave, having been explored about a mile; but as we had no guide and not much time to spare, we did not venture far. Today it has been "Over the hills and lofty mountains," all the time. We came over North mountain this eve, which is some; the most splendid sight I have seen yet; could see the mountains all around it; and the road went right over the top of it. Oh! it was grand, gloomy & peculiar": and "Rich, rare & racy." The road was, as usual, winding about back & forth on the side of the mountain: sometimes nearly perpendicular off below it; at which places we amused ourselves by rolling rocks down, to hear them tumble along among the the trees, etc. In the cave we came to a little branch of water that looked very pretty. We stopped awhile at Clifton's Forge to see the process of making "bar iron," it being on the road. There were two big hammers (awful big ones) which were raised by water power. The work was carried on by slaves. They are building a railroad through from the eastern part of Virginia to the Ohio river, which we see every once in while -sightful country to make a railroad through.

7th day the 25th. We have camped tonight by a widow's house under a large weeping willow, who furnished us hay & stable room. We left the pike awhile today. I thought I had seen rough, rocky roads, but the one we traveled then is unsurpassed. We went to the Natural Bridge this evening, went down under it; uo on it and all about it. Wonderful! Wonderful Wonderful!!! even beyond description. It is over Cedar Creek and is 230 feet from the water to the top of the arch, and 280 to the top of the bridge, and some 60 feet from one pillar, or abutment to the other. We got some rocks underneath and about the Bridge, and some arbovitae from the top if it, hanging over the side. I drove our team and wagon over it and we traveled on. We have seen lots of persimmons all along the road, but they are a sight yet, not ripe. (The distance form Lewisburg to the Natural Bridge is about 73 miles.

1st day the 26th. Have camped tonight close to a little creek and also a house. We crossed James rover on a bridge at a town called Buchanan. I do not know whether it was named after James or before him, but from its appearance I guess it was named before him. After crossing the river we commenced climbing the Blue Ridge, and better know there is some mountains along here. The Peaks of Otter are here, which are some peaks. We stopped and went up to the top of the highest one; it is one mile to the top, we walked, of course; but we could have rode part of the way. It was quite a walk too; raised the perspiration to a pretty high degree. It was raining some as we went up, but soon quit. We could look down on the world, & see the farms and houses beneath us, which indeed looked small. The mountain tops off around with clouds hanging around them, as well as some beneath us, looked grand in the extreme. The weather not being fair we could not see to a very great distance. We all drank some rain water that had collected in a hole on the highest rock on the peak; and by the way, the top was all rock. Each of us got a piece of

rock from the top, and some leaves of laurel, as near it as any grew, for memorials. The man close to where we are camped says that we are now across the Blue Ridge. We have seen an abundance of grape vines on which there has been lots of grapes, but mostly gone now; however we got a bucket full of very fine ones, & had a great repast.

2nd day the 27th. We are camped again by a fine old Virginian's. We came through Liberty this morning. Here we saw a train of cars, for the first time in the State of Virginia. Some rain this morn; crossed Goose Creek; saw some awful looking corn, most like Dick DAILY'S opponent Hezekiah is cooking bread & potatoes for supper & breakfast; he being "chief cook and bottle washer," (From the Natural Bridge to Buchanan 11 miles, from B. to the Peaks of Otter, 11, and from P. of O. to Liberty 10 miles.)

3rd day the 28th. We are camped tonight some $\frac{1}{2}$ mile from any house, not far from Chestnut Creek, Franklin County. The man that furnished feed and stable room for our horses last night gave us a bucket full of sweet potatoes. I wrote a letter home last night and mailed it at a little town today called Rocky Mount. Crossed Staunton river, Black Water, and Pig river all today. (Goose Creek yesterday). We are out of sight of the mountains save now & then a peak we see projecting above the hills. Slaves are to be seen all through here; see a large fine house all surrounded by shanties, and we know at once what it means. I never saw the inhumanity of the practice more striking than at a house we got feed at tonight. The houses were arranged as before stated, but what I alluded to was a little boy at the wood pile, ordering slaves about who were more than twice his size; but I suppose he was learned to it. (From Liberty to Rocky Mount 10 miles.)

Tracing, by various maps, the route of this wagon trip of 86 years ago, readers may find that the author mentions a number of towns or settlements which are now either in West Virginia or Virginia, as all being in the State of Virginia. In this the author was correct, as at that time, in 1856-1857, they were one state. West Virginia not being formed into a separate state until 1862. Last week's account brought our three travelers from the Natural Bridge in Virginia, on south across the Peaks of Otter, through Liberty and still south to Rocky Mount. They then crossed Staunton river the next day, where we left them in camp near Chestnut Creek, Franklin County. With this, the seventh installment, we find them just entering North Carolina, their objective state, for their first meeting with relatives or friends.

4th day the 29th. Joy to the Co., we now are in Rockingham Co., North Carolina. We have "put through" today; came through Martinsville, crossed Smith's river on a bridge, crossed the Virginia & N. C. line, & came through Leeksville in N. C., & camped some 2 miles from town of a creek. We got some fine specimens of isinglass along the road today in Va., the hills are full of it. Saw nothing very remarkable; but passed lots and lots of old fields grown up in pine bushes, a great many turned out, and now and

then a big tobacco patch was to be seen. There is a corn husking in the neighborhood tonight, and the woods just rings with the musical voices of the poor slaves, all as "merry as a marriage bell." One came along here just then with 6 or 8 fish to sell. He said that he was not going to the husking. We gave him a dime for 2 of his fish, and now we are anticipating a glorious repast in the morning. Our first breakfast in N. C. to be fresh fish, refreshing indeed. (From Rocky Mount to Martinsville, 30 miles; from M. to Leeksville 20).

5th day the 30th. We are now at Nathan H. CLARK'S, 15 miles from New Garden. Arrived here just before sundown this eve. We had fried fish for breakfast this morning, "the best in America." We crossed Dan River this morn a few miles from Leeksville; a pretty smart stream; crossed on a bridge. Stopped at noon on the bank of Troublesome Creek, and crossed Reedy Creek in the evening. We passed over the "Guilford battle grounds" a mile or so from here, but did not know it until we were nearly over them, when a man told us that it was the place where human beings were once assembled in battle array. There was a dwelling house in the valley, between the place where the British planted their cannon and where the Americans planted theirs. (The distance from Leeksville to New Garden is about 35 miles). We have been just 23 days from Richmond, Indiana, here; 603 miles, and cost us about \$10.00 each).

6th day the 31st. Hezekiah and I are still at Nathan CLARK'S and rather expect to board here during the coming week, as it is the week of N. C. Yearly Meeting. John started home this morning on horseback. H. and I went to New Garden Post Office this eve, hoping to get a letter from Carthage, but were disappointed. We then went to the Yearly Meeting House to see what sort of a place it was. The house (from outside appearance) looks quite venerable; the grave yard nearby is the most beautiful one I ever saw; the whole yard is overgrown with myrtle, instead of grass and weeds. I saw quite a number of tomb-stones there but all were plain. We next went to the Boarding School house and looked round there awhile; took tea there and then returned to N. CLARK'S. The location of both the Meeting and School houses are very delightful; all surrounded by groves of natural growth. The Meeting and School houses are about $\frac{1}{4}$ of a mile apart. Today there is a great "Jollification" among the Filmore party at Salisbury; can hear the "Cannon's opening roar", every little bit. I think there are several of that party here, and we found them quite numerous all through Virginia. I used a razor this morning for the first time since I left Carthage; just four weeks ago. (To be continued.)

CORRECTION VOL. III, No 3, Spring, 1979

From Mrs. Roger C. (Rosa) HIGGINS, P. O. Box 481, Fort Madison, Iowa 52627, great granddaughter of Michael COX, comes this correction via Charles R. PUGH, 4405 Boxwood Rd., Raleigh, NC 27612. He writes:

"The Michael COX who received power of attorney to sell land of Reubin COX in Grundy County, Missouri was an uncle (not a brother). Reubin and his twin brother, William COX, did return to Randolph Co., NC in 1859, as stated in the article 'William COX of Abel' pg. 13-16, Vol. III, No. 3, Spring, 1979.

"The relationship among the COXes was as follows:

- (1) The Michael COX in Missouri was a son of Joshua COX and Rachel DUSKIN.
- (2) Sarah COX, a daughter of Joshua COX, married Abel COX and they were the parents of the twins, Reubin and William, and 14 other children.
- (3) Martha COX, another daughter of Joshua COX, married Nathan CRAVEN. Martha died in 1837, presumably in Randolph County, many years before CRAVEN, who purchased land in Missouri from Reubin and William COX in 1859.

Part of the land owned by the COXes and CRAVENs in Grundy County, MO is now farmed by Dorne ALTENDERFER, a great grandson of Michael COX."

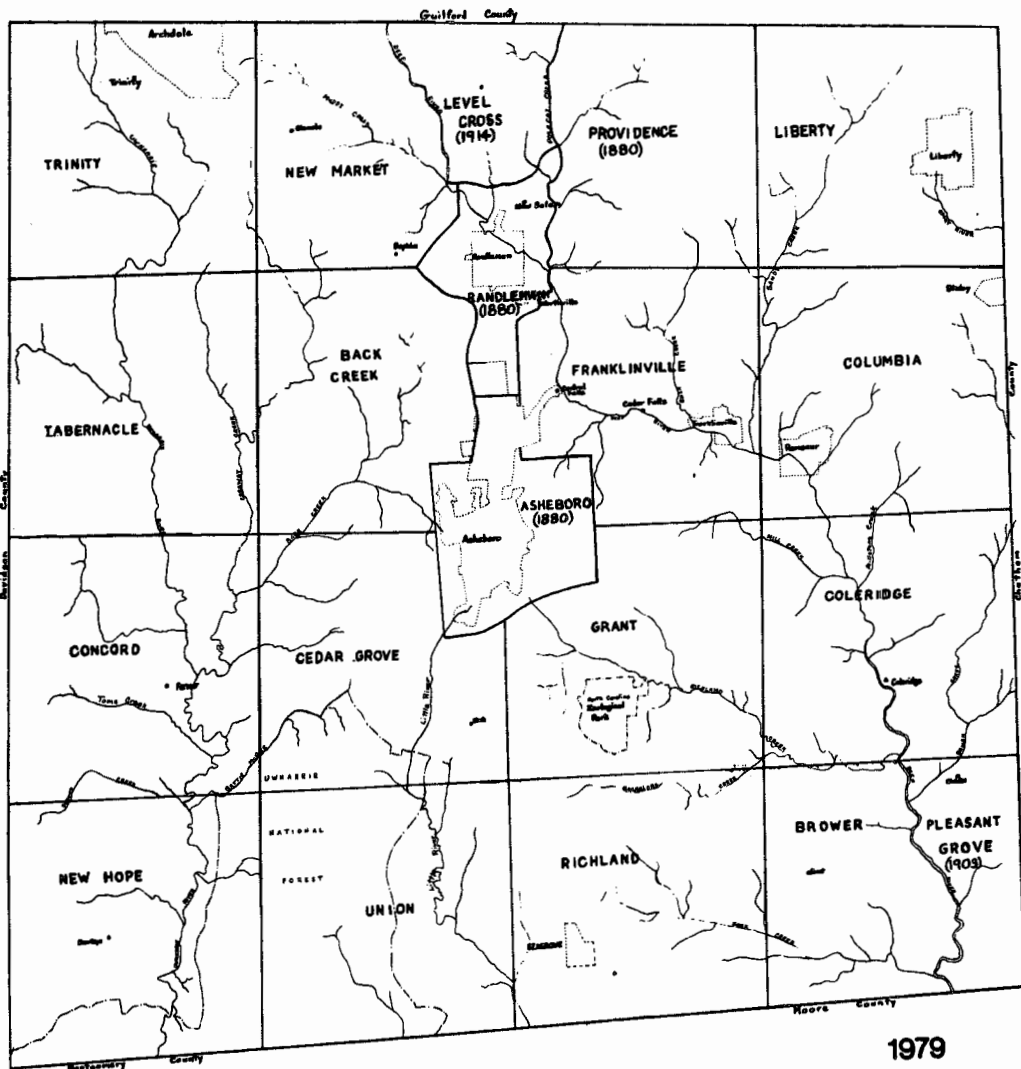

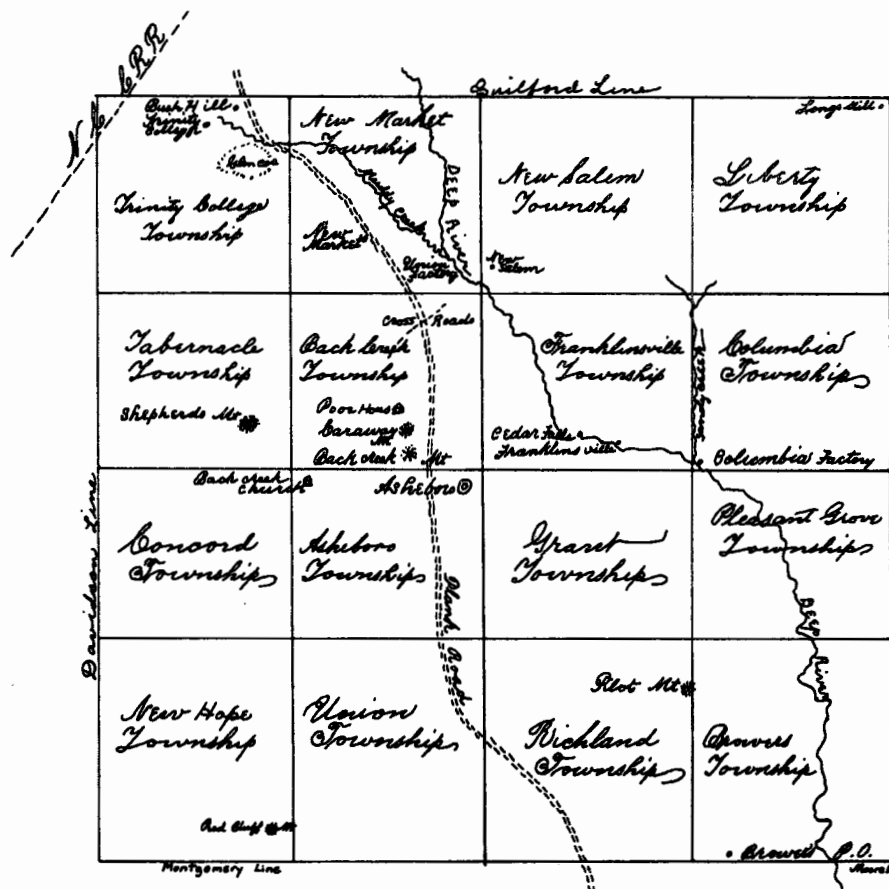
